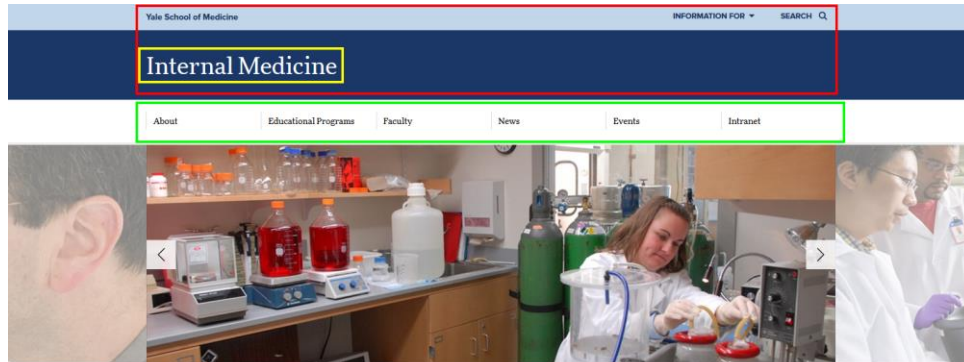


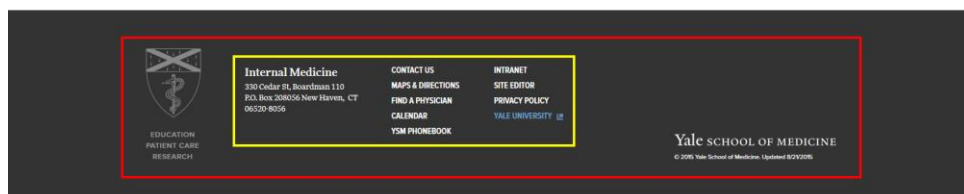
Green: You have significant control over the content in these areas although things like the font sizes and colors are **strictly** controlled by pre-determined template styles. For specific information about what is controlled by the template styling, please contact the Web Group.

Yellow: You have more limited customization in these areas. For example, the banner in which your site title appears will always be in the white font and size you see below and you are limited to 55 characters.

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Medical Approach to the Patient (MAP) - Internal Medicine Component Clerkship
